Main Barriers to Learning

- Lack of opportunity/cultural experiences
- Emotional wellbeing (e.g. anxiety, anger, withdrawal etc).
- Basic skills (e.g. reading, number skills, spelling, handwriting etc).

- School readiness (e.g. lack of routine at home, poor parenting, hungry on arrival, unsuitable clothing/footwear etc).
- Scarcity of aspirational role models at home/in the community.
- Peer pressure
